Message from Executive Director Rochelle Parker



Last year was full of upgrades and renovations at CAPA! With the support of the Victims of Crime Act and others like the Rotary Club of Eastern Independence and Junior League, CAPA was able to complete over \$120,000 in renovations and new equipment purchases. Those projects included working with dozens of UPS and community volunteers to install a new play therapy playground replacing the slightly unsafe, wooden structure we had been using. Other projects included purchasing new sand trays for therapy and sending all our therapists through the Play Therapy Institute – a ten-month training.

In 2018, we hope to complete another \$150,000 in repairs to our parking lot, heating and cooling systems, flooring, restrooms and food prep area. We want to create the best experience possible for those in our care, and it is because of supporters like you that this will be possible. We have added new staff positions going into 2018 thanks to the Jackson County Community Children's Services Fund and there is so much in store for CAPA! The more we grow, the more families we serve and the closer we are to eradicating child abuse.

Finally, yet importantly, we have a second office now because of some client need and location data we have been reviewing for the past four years. To more effectively serve families in the 20+ cities we work in, we decided to collaborate with Plexpod Westport in Kansas City to utilize space. Plexpod provides us with additional space for our in-home case management staff to work on case notes, make phone calls and have meetings. At Plexpod Westport, other non-profit agencies and new prospective corporate partners surround us, which is essential to our sustainability and continued growth. We are excited about CAPA Kansas City!

We already have ideas for 2019 and beyond and we are grateful to have you on this journey with us. From our friends in Lee's Summit to our friends in the southern part of the county, Grandview, we truly have a community that cares and we feel it every day. Operational Expense Percentages



CAPA's wish is that no child will ever have to know what it is *like to experience abuse.* But until that day comes, our doors are open 7 days a week to provide individual and family counseling to children and their families who have experienced the traumas of abuse and neglect.

We believe no family should have to face this challenge alone.

Children and individuals are given a voice through an array of trauma-focused therapies including art and play therapy as well as hypnotherapy so they can

tell their story and begin to heal.





CAPA understands that parenting is hard even in the very best of circumstances, and sometimes parents need a helping hand.

Our Healthy Families Jackson CountyTM home-based program aims to reduce the risk factors that could lead to adverse childhood experiences, such as child abuse and neglect. Our caring case managers work closely with the families to help promote family resiliency and healthy parenting skills. Through this program, families are connected to additional social and tangible resources and supports while increasing their knowledge of age-appropriate expectations for their children.



Prevention Education Services

Regardless of our roles at CAPA, I am convinced the one thing that binds us together and empowers us is "we feel the same way." There is a story that is part of my family's history that I believe gets to the heart of this "feeling."

My youngest son, Ryan, stuttered. He was smart enough and creative enough to find ways to adapt to what others saw as a flaw. To him, the stuttering was just an inconvenience. For Ryan certain letters and words were more challenging to say or enunciate than others. These words or letters could trigger a bout of stuttering or slow his ability to converse. Some of the letters that come to mind are L, W and Y. Words that contain these sounds were challenging as well. When Ryan would encounter one of these "triggers" he would employ a variety of tactics. The tactics were designed to enable him to navigate around or through whatever barrier was hindering his speech.

All of this is background information in order to share something that occurred countless times during our time together. Often when Ryan and I were together and during the course of our interactions, I would be moved to tell him what I was feeling. It would be simple and direct. "Ryan, I love you buddy," Ryan would smile at me and then something like this would occur. "I le, I le," then silence. "The word is," followed by a pause. "It starts with," another bit of silence. Then there'd be a longer pause and he would smile at me again and say, without hesitation, "I feel the same way, Dad!" You can't believe how this made me feel. Even now, years later, simply telling this story causes my heart to resonate with the memory of that

A number of years ago, CAPA faced some significant challenges. When we would meet to address these challenges, we would jokingly find encouragement in the expression "CAPA is Primed to Thrive." CAPA is no longer just "Primed to Thrive." No joke, CAPA is thriving! Because of our shared feelings and the power of hearts, minds and spirits that resonate together.
